

Transition Year General Education Advising

(2010/2011 Only)

Prepared by the General Education Council, March 22, 2010

Following are important points for advising for academic year 2010/2011 incoming first year students, transfers, and students who might change to the 2010 catalog and 120 hour graduation requirement. Changes or updates will be made as needed throughout the year.

1. All incoming students must take the **First Year Seminar** during their first semester. Current students with fewer than 24 credit hours who switch to the new catalog must take the course during their first semester under the new catalog. Transfers with more than 24 credit hours are exempt. A list of seminar titles and times is included.
2. Students under previous catalogs remain bound by those requirements. They should be directed into the approved transition courses or into the courses that satisfy those requirements. For example, Practical Living is not part of the new general education curriculum, but courses satisfying that requirement will continue to be offered for students in the pipeline. Incoming students should NOT be directed into Practical Living classes.
3. All students with ACT scores below 18 in English, 19 in Math, and 20 in reading **MUST** take placement tests **AND** take the **required developmental** courses **WITHIN THE FIRST TWO SEMESTERS OF ENROLLMENT**. Students who do not pass the required developmental courses within the first two semesters will be allowed to enroll in **ONLY** those courses until they pass them. 4. Phase One of General Education redesign begins in the fall 2010 semester. Only the First Year Seminar and redesigned **Required Core classes** in Math, English, and Communication will be available at that time. For the transition year, course numbers for the new courses are the same. Approved core courses are listed below:

First Year Seminar: **FYS 101**

Writing I: **ENG 100**

Writing II: **ENG 200**

Oral Communications: **CMSP 108** (proposal underway to change to COMM 108)

Math Reasoning: **MATH 131, 135, 152, 174, OR 175**

5. New Distribution Requirements and Capstone courses will be implemented in the fall semester of the 2011/2012 academic year. However, for the transition year 2010/2011, incoming students needing general education courses beyond the core must choose

courses from the following list of **approved “transition” courses**. These courses will count for both old and new Gen Ed during the transition year 2010/2011 only. Only one course may be chosen from each prefix in a category. Students choose **one** course in HUM 1, HUM 2, SBS1, etc. Categories and approved choices for 2010 are:

+For transition year only, 300 level courses are included. That level will not be part of the new Gen Ed.

6. Course **substitution forms will not** be needed when students take courses from this list. The Registrar has coded these classes in Datatel so they can be readily identified.
7. Students considering **switching to the new catalog** and the 120 credit hour graduation and 42 credit hour upper division requirements may choose to generate a “what-if” degree audit that shows how their program would be affected by the change. If the change is beneficial to the student, they may elect to request the change to the newer catalog year. Specific questions on eligibility should be directed to Dayna Seelig.

8. Some programs have identified “**Exchange Courses**” that will appear on the degree audit template in place of general education requirements. If a student changes majors, these exchanges follow the student. In some cases, students may have to take an additional course to meet program requirements.
9. A Gen Ed course cannot count as both a Gen Ed course and a program requirement course. If a Gen Ed course is selected as a program requirement, the student must select another choice from the same category to fulfill the Gen Ed requirement. This does NOT represent a change in university policy. Exchange Courses may be counted as both Gen Ed and program supplement.
