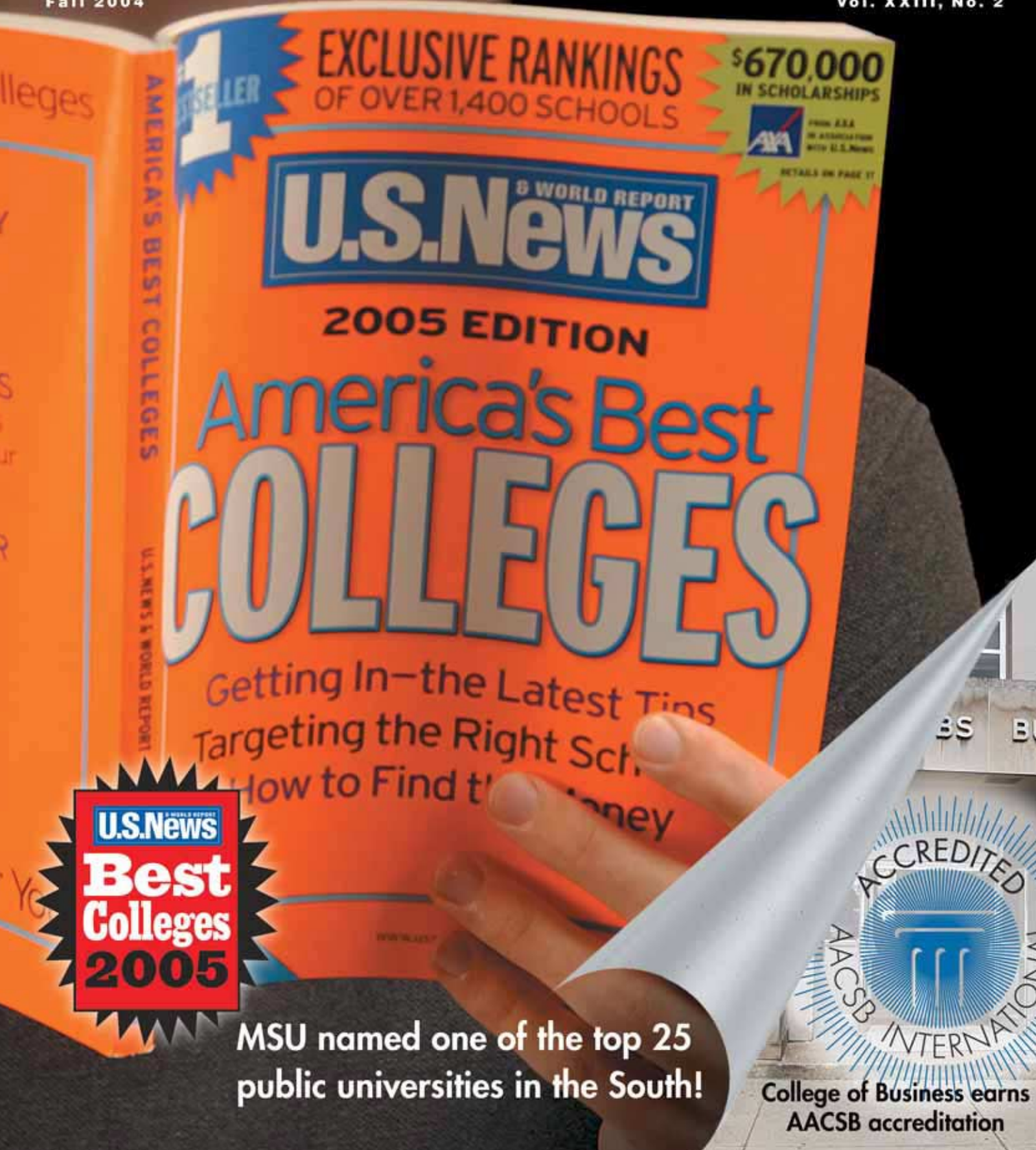

Preparing facilities for the fall term has been the goal for those units housed in the Adron Doran University Center. **MSU named one of top public universities**

Morehead State University is recognized as one of the top public universities in the South in the newly-published 2005 edition of "America's Best Colleges" by U.S. News & World Report.

The rankings are based on the magazine's research on more than 1,400 institutions nationally.

"We are pleased and proud that this prestigious magazine has realized what a great institution is serving this area of Kentucky," President Ronald G. Eaglin said in announcing the ranking during a meeting of the MSU Board of Regents. "Faculty, staff and students deserve all of the credit for this significant achievement and we are confident that the future will be even brighter for those who join the Morehead State family."

Specifically, MSU is ranked in the top 25 public institutions which grant bachelor's and master's degrees in 12 states, including Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Arkansas and Louisiana.

President Eaglin noted that only two other regional universities - Western Kentucky and Murray State - share that

distinction in Kentucky. He said that Morehead State was ranked three years ago in the third tier of institutions before moving up to the second tier in 2004 and now to the top tier in 2005.

"It is gratifying to have U.S. News & World Report recognize our commitment to excellence through relatively small classes, full-time faculty at all class levels, a reasonable cost of attendance and steady improvement in graduation and retention rates," Dr. Eaglin stated. "We will continue to strengthen other aspects of the University's growing academic reputation."

He added that MSU's inclusion in "America's Best Colleges" closely follows the accreditation of the College of Business by AACSB International, an honor shared by only 15 percent of the collegiate schools of business in the world, and the establishment of a bachelor's degree in space science, the fourth such program in the United States.

MSU was founded in 1887 as a private college, became a public institution in 1922, and gained university status in 1966.

MSU receives research center grant

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers has announced that Morehead State University has been selected to receive \$497,000 in funding from the Department of Education for administration of an Intergovernmental Relations Research Center. The center, jointly administered by the University of Kentucky, will study the effects of public policy at the state and local levels of government. The focus of this research will primarily be on homeland security policy and related intergovernmental management issues.

"I am pleased that the federal government has recognized the first class research skills at Morehead State University," Rogers said. "This research will be an asset for state and local policy makers as they work to keep our nation safe from terrorist attack. Truly homeland security is hometown security."

Rogers worked to secure funding for this project in his role as a senior member of the House Appropriations Committee.

**'Country Girls' at KFAC**

The Kentucky Folk Art Center is displaying an exhibit titled "Country Girls: The Works of Seven Rural Women Folk Artists" through Nov. 28. "Country Girls" features more than 35 recent works by seven female folk artists, who range in age from their 30s to their 70s. MSU offers one of four space science degrees in nation



Morehead State University has joined the ranks of Embry-Riddle, Florida Institute of Technology and City University of New York as the only universities in the United States to offer a Bachelor of Science degree in space science. The new program was approved by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education earlier this year.

"Without a doubt, the Space Science Center will be the most exciting and influential program in East Kentucky," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "Space is the future and being able to prepare students for work in

this field will be challenging, but the accomplishment will make others become aware of this campus and its educators."

The curriculum will make a positive impact on the state's economy by preparing Kentuckians for careers in physics, astrophysics, satellite telecommunications, electrical engineering, mathematics, computer science and wireless technology.

MSU's Space Science Center was established in January 2001 after a Space Act Agreement was signed with NASA. The Space Science Center will operate a 21 Meter Space Tracking Antenna for research and student training that is expected to come online in December.

The Space Science Center will provide a research and educational facility with state-of-the-art laboratories for undergraduate students in space science. Space science is an extremely interdisciplinary and technology-intensive discipline that encompasses physics, astrophysics, satellite telecommunications, electrical engineering, mathematics and computer sciences.

New degree programs to be offered will include: B.S. in Space Science, and B.S. in Physics with an Area of Concentration in Astrophysics and a Minor in Astronomy. Morehead State University has received significant funding from NASA, the Kentucky Science and Engineering Foundation, National Science Foundation and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet.

MSU supports University Center of Mountains

Morehead State University's Board of Regents has formalized the institution's ongoing participation in the University Center of the Mountains, a unique partnership providing access to four-year and graduate degrees to citizens in eight mountain counties of East Kentucky.

President Ronald G. Eaglin recently attended a meeting of the UCM Leadership Team in Hazard where he described the joint venture of MSU, Eastern Kentucky University, Hazard Community and Technical College and the Kentucky Community and Technical College System.

"In my view, we as institutional leaders have no greater duty than delivering quality, affordable higher education to those who cannot relocate or reasonably commute to a residential campus," he stated.

Headquartered at the main campus of HCTC in Hazard, the year-old consortium offers upper division and graduate classes at four locations, including MSU facilities in Hindman

and Jackson. The eight counties targeted by UCM are Breathitt, Knott, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Owsley, Perry and Wolfe.

Dr. Eaglin spoke of his personal pride in MSU's 30-year tradition of delivering higher education to those who cannot leave home.

"Morehead State has five regional centers, more than any other institution in Kentucky, and I'm proud to say that Jackson and Mount Sterling were established on my watch and that the one in Jackson is a UCM teaching site," he said.

The resolution adopted by MSU's Board of Regents commits the University to provide limited human and fiscal resources to the UCM partnership but to work with the other partners to secure separate funding from the state legislature.

"All of us should be proud of the significant progress made toward full realization of our shared vision of the equivalent of a public university to serve the good people of the mountains with bachelor's and master's degrees," Dr. Eaglin said in recommending adoption of the resolution at the Regents meeting.

UCM is hopeful of receiving \$500,000 in state funds, if and when a budget is adopted by the General Assembly, according to Ron Daley, director.



New MSU facility opened at Prestonsburg

President Ronald G. Eaglin and other MSU officials recently participated in the official opening of the new home of Morehead State University at Prestonsburg. The new facility is located on the Big Sandy Community and Technical College campus in Prestonsburg.

The program included the dedication of the new Margaret S. Lewis Learning Center in memory of the former director of MSU at Prestonsburg who died in a traffic accident in 2002 after serving 10 years in the post.

In partnership with the Big Sandy Community and Technical College, students may earn a bachelor's degree at the MSU Prestonsburg campus in a variety of fields including accounting, computer information sciences, elementary and middle grades education, management, nursing, social work and university studies. A master's degree is available in business administration, education and, new this fall, adult and higher education, as well as graduate-level professional certification programs in education.

MSU at Ashland has moved to ACTC

Ashland Community and Technical College and Morehead State University have announced the move of the MSU at Ashland regional center to ACTC's College Drive Campus. Registration, orientation, classes and other services offered by MSU in Ashland are now available at the ACTC campus.

"We are delighted by becoming the permanent guests of President Adkins and his campus family," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "This change allows for a much more efficient operation of MSU at Ashland in these difficult budgetary times and, as a bonus, will free up resources that can be used for expansion of academic programs."

Jack Webb (63), director of MSU at Ashland, said the move is beneficial to students because they can enroll at ACTC, a two-year college, then go on to finish a bachelor's or master's degree at MSU without ever having to switch to another campus. MSU has the same arrangement at the Prestonsburg campus of Big Sandy Community and Technical College.



Admissions is in new location

Morehead State University's Office of Admissions has moved into its new location. The group moved from the Howell-McDowell Administration Building, which has served as the admissions home for many years, to the new Admissions Center.

Behind the Adron Doran University Center, the MSU Admissions Center is positioned on the corner of Normal Avenue and Second Street.

"We have reserved parking in front of our building and are on the ground floor, which should make it easier to become aware of our new site. It will be a smoother process for

students and parents to come obtain the material they desire about Morehead State University," said Joel Pace (92), director of admissions.

The two-story structure previously housed various state government offices. In addition to the Office of Admissions, it will be occupied by the Office of Institutional Research and Computer Applications on the second floor and Gov. Ernie Fletcher's East Kentucky regional office on the first floor.

MSU offers MAT for middle grades

Morehead State University is now offering a Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) degree for Middle Grades. The two-year program is designed for anyone holding a bachelor's degree who desires to teach in one of four middle grade certification areas: language arts, mathematics, science or social studies.

People who have majors or minors in these areas may have met content specific requirements; those who have other majors or minors will be required to take additional course work.

Once admitted into this program, an enrollee may begin teaching in any middle school in Kentucky under a temporary provisional teaching certificate while taking courses to earn full certification. The program may be completed in two years; during the second year, students will participate in the Kentucky Teacher Internship Program.

The MAT Middle Grades offers two tracks: 1) one for those fully employed as middle grade teachers under Kentucky's temporary provisional teaching certificate; 2) one for those not yet employed in middle schools who must participate in extensive field experiences in middle grade classrooms.

University faculty and field supervisors as well as mentors in public schools will guide all teaching experiences.

100% of Rad Tech grads pass ARRT exam

All of Morehead State University's spring radiologic technology graduates passed the national licensure exam on their first attempt.

The 100 percent pass rate of the 32 students on the American Registry of Radiologic

Technologists (ARRT) exam reflects well not only on them, but also on everyone involved with their education, according to Barbara Dehner (76), coordinator of radiologic sciences programs. "Passing this exam certifies our graduates to work as a radiologic technologist in any state in the U.S.," she said.

Students in radiologic sciences take one year of general education and additional prerequisite courses on campus. They then complete program-specific courses, participate in simulated laboratory practice, and gain clinical practical experience in radiology departments of medical facilities. Upon completion of their degree, they are eligible to take the board exams through ARRT. Twenty members of this spring's class have elected to pursue an advanced option.

Button Auditorium to be repaired

Two major sections of Morehead State University's Button Auditorium building will be closed for a four-month period at the end of 2004 and beginning of 2005 to allow for repairs to the historic structure.

No events will be scheduled in the auditorium or multi-purpose room between Oct. 1, 2004, and Jan. 31, 2005, according to Madonna Weathers (71), vice president for student life.

"We regret the inconvenience but taking the building off line is necessary to allow time for significant exterior and interior repairs," she said. "As a result, the building will be safer and more comfortable."

The Department of Military Science will continue to use its classrooms and offices on the first and third floors, including the indoor range utilized by the MSU rifle team.

Some of the exterior work will be scheduled this summer, Weathers added. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$750,000.

Built in 1928, the building contains classrooms, offices and a 1,250-seat auditorium/theatre. It was the site of the University's first gymnasium which was modified in 1968 to house MSU's Army ROTC program. The building was named in honor of Frank C. Button, first president of the University. It has been listed since 1995 on the National Register of Historic Places.

Morehead State University has achieved accreditation of its bachelor's and master's degree programs in business administration in its College of Business by recent action of the Board of Directors of AACSB International - The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

The official announcement was made in St. Louis, Mo., at AACSB headquarters.

"This is the most important accomplishment in the history of our College of Business and we are immensely proud of Dean Bob Albert (84) and his faculty and staff for earning the highest accreditation possible," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "We are very pleased that AACSB has recognized the quality of the teaching and learning in our business programs."

To achieve accreditation, business programs must satisfy the expectations of a wide range of quality standards relating to strategic management of resources, interactions of faculty and students in the educational process, and achievement of learning goals in degree programs.

These standards are mission-linked. During the accreditation process, Morehead State was visited and evaluated by business school deans with detailed knowledge of management education, applying accreditation standards that are widely accepted in the educational community.

Dr. Robert Albert, dean of the College of Business, said of the announcement:

"This process has taken nearly six years and is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our faculty and staff. As a result, today we are positioned among the most elite business programs in the world - only 15 percent of all business colleges worldwide have passed the rigorous review process and have met the standards for AACSB accreditation."

Dr. Albert expressed appreciation for the work of Dr. L. K. Williams, assistant dean, who led the accreditation task force effort, including writing the college's comprehensive self-evaluation report which, in turn, provided the basis for the successful



accreditation review. The dean also thanked President Eaglin and Provost Michael Moore for their support of the college's candidacy for AACSB accreditation.

AACSB International is a not-for-profit organization consisting of more than 900 educational organizations and corporations. Its mission is excellence in management education in colleges and universities. AACSB International is the premier accrediting agency and service organization for business schools.

MSU's College of Business has 50 full-time faculty members and enrolls more than 1,200 majors at the associate, bachelor's and

master's degree levels. It established Kentucky's first fully online degree program with the MBA in 1999.

The College was recognized during the AACSB conference in Montreal, Canada.

Academic programs in the College of Business include the bachelor of business administration with options in accounting, economics, finance, management, marketing, real estate, computer information systems, business information systems, and business and information technology education.

The College also manages the East Kentucky Small Business Development Center and an economics education program.

It soon will begin directing the new Satellite Innovation and Commercialization Center in West Liberty.

MSU to honor golf coach, launch The First Tee program

Morehead State University has announced plans to honor its veteran golf coach, Dr. Rex Chaney (57), by creating a golf instructional complex in his name to host a community-based chapter of "The First Tee" program for young golfers.

The Rex Chaney Golf Academy will include a three-hole "real experience area," a driving range, an indoor learning center and other facilities. In addition to teaching golf, The First Tee emphasizes nine core values of responsibility, honesty, respect, courtesy, integrity, judgment, confidence, perseverance and sportsmanship.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin and Morehead businessman Tommy Griffith are heading a campaign through the MSU Foundation to raise funds to build and equip the complex on University land adjacent to SunnyBrook Golf Course, east of Morehead on U.S. 60.

Those funds will be combined with grants to establish a local unit of The First Tee to serve youngsters from Rowan and surrounding counties. Partnering with MSU in The First Tee program will be several youth-related organizations.

"Building and naming the golf academy and starting a chapter of The First Tee represent great opportunities to recognize this

dedicated teacher and coach who has devoted his entire career to the young people of East Kentucky," Dr. Eaglin said. "We hope all whose lives he has touched so positively will join us in this tribute."

A native of Perry County, Dr. Chaney was an MSU faculty member for nearly 40 years and holds the distinction of being an Ohio Valley Conference coach of the year in two sports, golf and baseball.

He has coached the MSU golf squad for 27 years. Under his leadership, the Eagles captured the 1977, 1981, 1993 and 1999 OVC golf titles, earning him "Coach of the Year" honors for those seasons. He was head baseball coach from 1961 through 1967 and his Eagles won OVC East Division championships in 1961, 1962, 1963 and 1964. He was the OVC's baseball "coach of the year" in 1963. He also served four years as assistant basketball coach under former head coach Bobby Laughlin.

Dr. Chaney holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Morehead State and a doctorate from Indiana University. He joined the MSU faculty in 1961 and retired from full-time teaching in 1977.

Starting a chapter of The First Tee has been under consideration for the last year or so, according to Dan Cornett (70), manager of SunnyBrook.

"The First Tee is a great program that enables kids from all types of backgrounds to learn a game that teaches values for life and which can be played for a lifetime," Cornett said. "We are in the midst of the application process for a chapter and are anxious to move ahead with the golf academy."

The First Tee was started in 1997 under sponsorship of golf's major organizations, including the Professional Golf Association (PGA) Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA), Augusta National Golf Club and U.S. Golf Association (USGA).

Now a division of the World Golf Foundation, The First Tee's mission is "to impact the lives of young people around the world by creating affordable and accessible golf facilities to primarily serve those who have not previously had exposure to the game and its positive values."

The First Tee has more than 150 local facilities with two operating in Kentucky and three others being developed. Its objective is to serve 500,000 youth by the end of 2005.

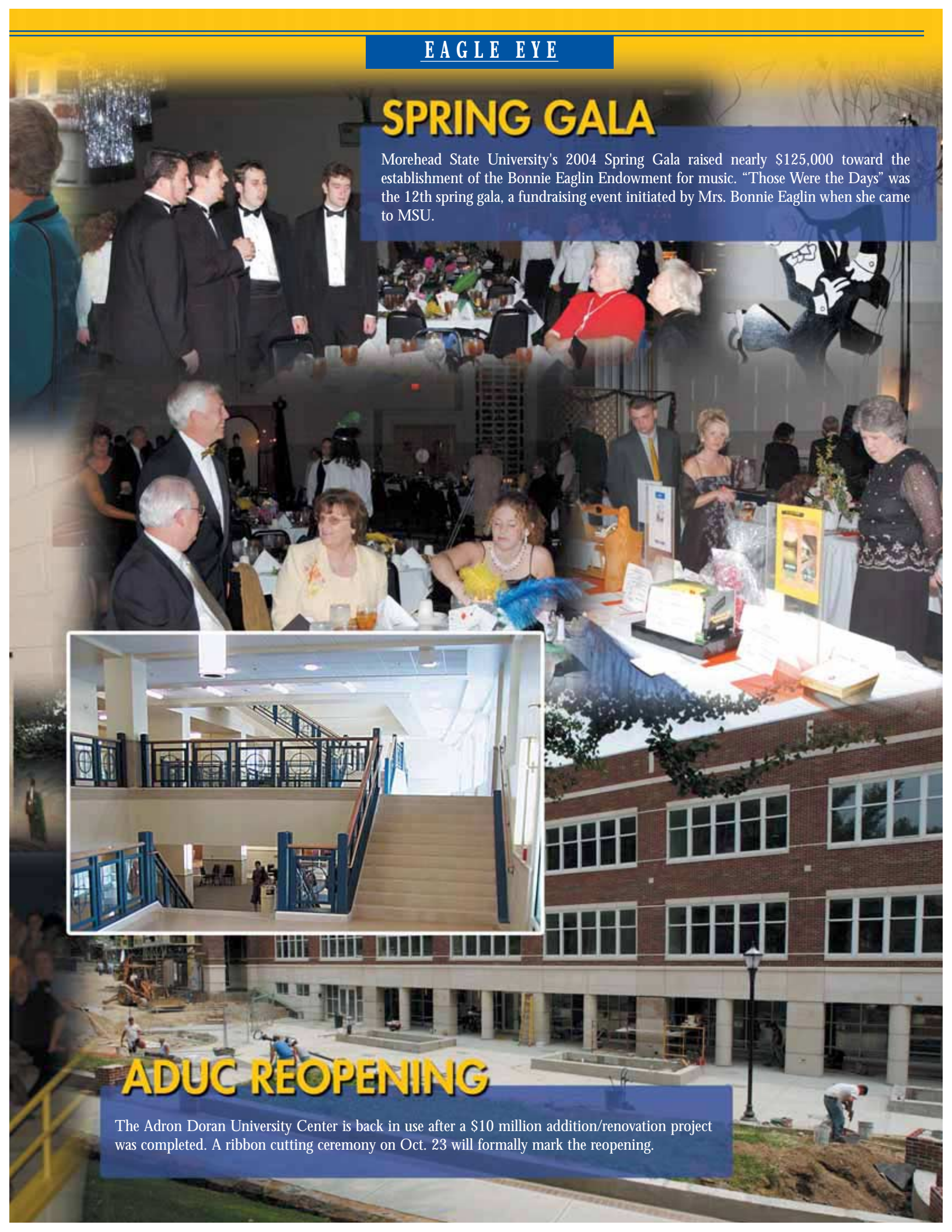

He was a three-time All-Ohio Valley Conference First Team selection and was Player of the Year in the league in 2002-03.



Brown earns Morehead State's first Steve Hamilton Sportsmanship Award

Despite the fact that the award was named for former Morehead State athlete, coach and administrator, the late Steve Hamilton, no Eagle or Lady Eagle had ever won the Ohio Valley Conference's Steve Hamilton Sportsmanship Award until now. Kandi Brown (Olive Hill, Ky./West Carter HS), a senior guard/forward on the MSU women's basketball team, was chosen as this year's recipient.

Brown finished her career as the most proficient free throw shooter in NCAA women's basketball history, connecting on 91.54 percent of her 390 attempts. In addition, last season she tied the OVC record for most consecutive made free throws at 41 and broke the OVC all-time mark for made three-pointers, finishing her four-year career with 248.

Brian Hutchinson named interim director of athletics at MSU



Brian Hutchinson (96), has been named interim director of athletics at Morehead State University effective Sept. 6, 2004. He will replace Chip Smith, who was named athletic director at Western Carolina University effective the same date.

Hutchinson has spent the last five years as MSU's associate director of athletics, serving as sport administrator for football, golf, baseball and volleyball as well as the athletic training operation, managing day-to-day operations of the department, managing the department's annual budget and serving as the department's ticket manager.

Olympic fencer has MSU ties

A former Morehead State University student was in Athens, Greece, as a member of the Olympic Fencing team. Sean Shumate (99) has triumphed over many difficulties to be one of the select few.

The following excerpts are from a report that aired on Louisville station WAVE-TV on Shumate and his quest for a gold medal. The material, reported by Connie Leonard of WAVE-TV, is reprinted with permission:

A local man will represent Louisville in Athens, Greece, this September as he goes for the Olympic Gold in fencing. Getting to the games is tough for every athlete, but this competitor is all about overcoming obstacles.

As sporting competitions go, fencing is one of the oldest around. "It kind of faded from glory for awhile, then came back in," says 33-year-old Sean Shumate.

And this year, the quick and aggressive game of fencing finds its roots in Athens,

the birthplace of the Olympics. "I guess if there was a time to make the Olympic team, it was now," Sean says.

Hard work has paid off for Sean. The Louisvillian is going to Greece, and he's come a long way to get there. Thirteen years ago, a car accident paralyzed Sean from the waist down. "I slid through an S-curve and went over a cliff," he says.

After the crash, Sean says he wanted to pursue sports, even in his wheelchair. "I tried basketball and other disabled sports," he says, "and I always felt like it was a disabled sport."

That changed when Sean discovered fencing a few years ago. Both his mind and body were put to the test in what's known as a physical game of chess. "You're sort of thinking above your opponent, you're two moves ahead of what you're actually doing at the time."

And while able-bodied fencers can jump back from the blade if they're not ready, wheelchair fencers can't move.

"They have to be ready immediately after the referee says 'Fence!'" says Leszck "Maestro" Stawicki, Sean's coach from the Louisville Fencing Center.

Sean says his friends at the center helped him make the April cut in Atlanta for the U.S. Para-Olympic team, and no one more so than Les, who has also led able-bodied fencers to the Olympics. "Everything that I've gotten, I've gotten from my coach and the people that I fence with and train me that were Olympians before I was."

Sean says competing on this level is awe inspiring. "To be recognized as one of the premier wheelchair athletes in the United States is ... I kind of look in the mirror and say 'is that really you?' sometimes."

Sean is among five men and three women on the U.S. team competing in Athens September 20th through September 23rd. Sean says he is not worried about security threats in Greece - he's just happy to be going.

Shumate was enrolled at MSU in the 1990s where he was a recreation major and a member of Sigma Nu fraternity.



Bill Harrell, former coach, dies in Indiana

Former MSU men's basketball coach Bill Harrell, 76, died July 30 while fishing alone in Muncie, Ind. His death was determined to be caused by a "cardiac event" or drowning because of a "cardiac mishap," according to the county coroner.

Harrell coached the Eagles from 1969 to 1974 and amassed a 68-59 overall record, winning Ohio Valley Conference regular-season titles in 1971-72 and 1973-74.



Lampkins becomes Morehead State's second straight NCAA State Woman of the Year

Former Morehead State women's volleyball star and three-time All-Ohio Valley Conference selection Cherelle Lampkins (04) has been named the Kentucky state winner of the NCAA Woman of the Year Award. It marks the second straight year that MSU has had an individual earn the honor. Former Lady Eagle women's basketball standout Travece Turner (03) became the first Morehead State student-athlete to be selected as a state winner when she was recognized last year.

The award recognizes "outstanding female student-athletes who show strong achievement in academics, athletics and community leadership" and have completed their collegiate athletics eligibility in their primary sport.

Lampkins earned First-Team All-OVC honors last year after helping lead the Eagles to a 21-11 overall record and their first conference regular-season title in 13 years.

A 2004 cum laude graduate with a 3.648 GPA and a degree in exercise science, Lampkins earned Second-Team Academic All-District IV honors in 2003, was a member of the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll for three years and the MSU Dean's List (3.5 GPA) in six semesters.

College of Business alumni and friends providing for growth through endowments

We certainly appreciate every opportunity to double our money," said Bob Albert (84), dean of the College of Business. "Also, the enthusiasm and alumni support for the College of Business has historically been strong. Fueled by the recent accreditation success, the pride our alumni feel in their College of Business education is even stronger, and they are giving back."

This endowment fund joins three other endowments established in support of the College of Business:

- The Bertha Mills Booth Endowment for Business Research supplements institutional and external funding of applied research in regional economic development.
- The Gregory Palmer Endowment for Business established a professorship in accounting.
- The Elmer and Donna Smith Endowment for Business supports a chair in information systems.

Together, these endowments total more than \$1,000,000 and provide for the growth of the College of Business programs as well as fuel the research of faculty and students.

MSU at Mount Sterling Scholarship Endowment: Matched by Bucks for Brains

MSU at Mount Sterling is a campus in action. After moving into new facilities in October 2003, enrollment and community visibility have grown for this regional campus. To assist students who attend this extended campus, alumni, local businesses and other friends of the University have joined together to create the MSU at Mount Sterling Scholarship Endowment. Nearly \$80,000 has already been raised toward the \$125,000 goal for this scholarship which will be matched dollar-for-dollar through the Council on Postsecondary Education's Bucks for Brains program. An additional \$29,000 in deferred gifts has also been pledged to support the scholarship endowment.


Janet Kenney, director of MSU Mount Sterling, attributes the success of this fundraising endeavor to the efforts of her volunteer board. "There is a great enthusiasm in this community for MSU's presence, and people are committed to increasing educational opportunities. The board's support of this initiative and their willingness to be advocates to others has made the critical difference."

The MSU Mount Sterling Endowment supports scholarships for students who meet one of the following criteria:

- six or more credit hours at the MSU Mount Sterling
- from Montgomery and the other service area counties including Bath, Clark, Menifee and Powell
- with a demonstrated financial need, or
- attending classes on the main MSU campus for degree completion who have transferred from MSU Mount Sterling.

In addition to the MSU at Mount Sterling Scholarship fund, three of the other four extended campuses have endowment support. Extended campuses currently serve a third of the University student population with locations in Ashland, Jackson, Mount Sterling, Prestonsburg and West Liberty. 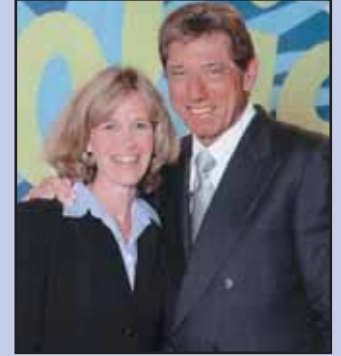

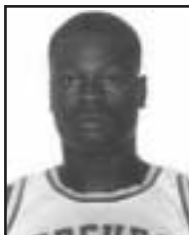
